- These costs are an estimate for care from a baby to release.
- The costs of a turtle varies greatly because they come to us injured from mowing and hit by car accidents. Therefore, antibiotics and medical treatments can last for quite some time. The more severely injured can take up to 2 years to heal before release.
- Snakes, toads and frogs also come to us injured and require medical care.
